HL 3012: THE DISCOURSE OF LOVE

Learning Objective

This course aims to provide intermediate-to-advanced-level students with an introduction to one of the most represented topics in Western literature.

Content

We begin with Plato's *Symposium*, and move on to recent theorizations and philosophies of love. More than simply addressing thematic concerns, this course will approach love as a philosophy and a discursive practice, as well as address the issues of subjectivity, the Self-Other relation and difference, all of which are central to love. Our final aim is to evaluate the potential for love to serve as a discourse of alterity. We will be covering a variety of discourses and texts: philosophy, psychoanalysis, feminism and literary theory; film and literary works by both male and female authors and poets.
