To this end, this course explores a range of contemporary women's writing, primarily focusing on these texts as exemplary of 'women's writing'. We will thus be dealing with the politics of gender identity, female desire, sexuality, and how these intersect with class, race, nation, and other ideological formations. We will also address the texts as exemplary of contemporary writing, dealing with narrative language and structure, new experimental forms of writing, postmodern reality, as well as the construction of the shattered/split postmodern subject.
