

# HL2024 Approaches to Literature Semester 1, 2021/22

This introductory literary theory course aims to develop a greater self-awareness in the understanding of the reading process and of critical practice. Students will be introduced to fundamental theoretical and critical concepts central to the study of English Literature. By focussing on a specific theoretical context each week, the module aims to develop fluency and confidence towards being critical readers of literature, as well as to develop an awareness of the environments in which literary texts are produced.
